Ore City ISD has set in place several programs to address violent or criminal incidents, as well as lesser offenses as identified by our Student Code of Conduct that is approved yearly by the OCISD Board of Trustees. Ore City ISD offers prevention programs and activities to help deter our students from drug/alcohol/tobacco use. The district provides counseling to all students using drugs or alcohol or refers them to local agencies. Violence prevention programs and activities are also offered to Ore City ISD students. Another important part of our programs is our outreach to involve parents in all activities at Ore City ISD.

SAFETY & SECURITY SERVICES OF ORE CITY ISD

At Ore City ISD, we are proud of our schools and welcome visitors. In order to protect the security of our students and staff and the learning environment at our schools visitors must adhere to the following guidelines:

- All visitors to campuses must report to the school office, present a government issued photo ID, sign in and state a reason for being on campus and obtain approval from the principal or designee.
- All visitors to school campuses shall wear a visitor name badge provided by the school office
- Media representative shall arrange visits to school campuses with the District Administrative office
- Visitors are to wear appropriate attire when visiting district schools.
- Due to privacy issues, videotaping in the classroom by parents is not permitted. Exceptions shall be granted only by the superintendent or designee.
- A visitor who fails to comply with any of these guidelines and/or district policies may be prohibited from visiting the school and other district facilities.

ORE CITY ISD'S COMPREHENSIVE SAFETY AND SECURITY PROGRAM INCLUDES

- All Ore City ISD campuses use the RAPTOR electronic visitor management system. The RAPTOR system, which requires the visitor to present a driver's license, logs the visitor into the building and

provides the visitor with temporary, photo-identification badge to wear while in the building. The visitor management system also checks the visitor's identification against a nationwide database of registered sex offenders.

- A district wide radio system provides timely access between campuses and central administration.
- Cameras systems in all schools help administrators monitor the interior and exterior of the buildings.
- Ore City ISD has a canine program (Interquest Detection Canines of Northeast Texas) that makes specially trained dog handler teams available to detect the presence of drugs, alcohol or explosive devices. The teams check the OCISD campuses and other facilities, including cars parked on district property, school lockers, classrooms and common areas of the buildings.
- A Campus Watch Program is active on all campuses. The program is administered through the Superintendent's office in which community volunteers have been trained and approved to assist in ensuring our campuses are safe and provides citizen involvement in reporting and preventing criminal activity.
- Criminal history background checks are required for all applicants for employment, volunteers, mentors, and contractors.
- Each campus has a copy of the District Emergency Procedures Manual.
- Each campus has an individual security plan.
- Weapons and threat assessment guidelines are in place.
